## **ALC Students Work Well In Corporate World**

Several Academy Learning Center (ALC) students are working successfully in a corporate environment at the Manalapan based RxS LLC, a provider of "Compliance Sample Management Solutions" to pharmaceutical and biotech companies.

For years, ALC students, and students from other ESCNJ school Community-based Instruction (CBI) have done well with area employers, including department stores, supermarkets and restaurants. However, ALC's Vocational Education Teacher Judy Kellner, and Mrs. Rena Brenman, a CBI aide, said the placement at RxS is particularly significant because it demonstrates some students "are capable of working productively and interacting with employees in a corporate setting."

"This is a good job, and I like coming here," said ALC student Tanvee Patel, one of the workers at RxS.

The ALC students work at RxS Mondays and Wednesdays. The students open returned envelopes containing signed acknowledgment forms sent from doctor's offices confirming receipt of various drug samples. The drug samples were distributed to the doctors by sales representatives from various pharmaceutical firms. After opening each envelope, the students remove the form, and then stack it in the appropriate pile, which can range from signed forms and unsigned forms, to forms that are ripped. All forms are then transferred to another department for scanning and data entry. Mrs. Brenman is with the students in their designated office space at all times and double-checks their work.

Sorting the forms is a significant responsibility which has to be completed by RxS mailroom employees when the students are not on site.

"Distribution of pharmaceutical samples is strictly monitored by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, and one of our key roles is establishing a paper trail that ensures the product has been distributed properly," said RxS Managing Director Mr. Mark Jara.

"The student's role is significant

because they are the first step in establishing that a doctor's office has returned their form related to the sample drugs they received from the sales representatives," Mr. Jara added.

RxS clients include various U.S. based multinational pharmaceutical companies, including small, midsize and biotech startups, representing thousands of sales representatives.

"We are more than satisfied with the student's contribution, and see no reason why this relationship cannot continue indefinitely," said Mr. Jara, whose company recently relocated to

### **Bike Rider Keeps Raising Funds For PRDS Students**

Orn without a heartbeat and unable to breathe on her own, Ashley Perez, a student at PRDS since the age of three, is considered a "miracle child."

Now 16 and nonverbal, Ashley has battled additional challenges including cerebral palsy, seizure disorders and visual impairment. Nevertheless, she usually has a huge smile and enjoys interacting with people, said Case Manager Debbie Bussiere.

"She saves the biggest smiles for her mom," Ms. Bussiere said, adding: "It is obvious where Ashley learned resilience and courage."

That attitude is why Ashley's family was the "obvious choice" to receive the \$6,200 raised by Mr. William Zuppa's OneManOneBikeOneChild not for profit organization.

Mr. Zuppa has been riding thousands of miles to raise funds for PRDS families ever since his nephew, Georgie Caunt, a former PRDS student, passed away at the age of 14 in 1995. Each year the PRDS OneManOneBikeOneChild Committee votes to determine which of several PRDS families nominated should be awarded the funds raised by Mr. Zuppa.

"This is a special moment and I know the money will be used to benefit Ashley," Mr. Zuppa said. •

"The idea is to have a welcoming, predictable routine for students to start the day with and get in the right frame of mind for learning," said NAA Principal Chastity Rivera.

The main Morning Meeting components include: a personal welcome from staff to each student; a comment about the previous day from each student once they are in their classroom; a group activity such as yoga or exercise, followed by the "morning message," or discussion of

the day's agenda.

"The routine sets the tone for respectful learning, establishes a climate of trust, and addresses the need for belonging," said Mrs. Rivera.

The approach often transforms "ordinary moments into extraordinary moments, by merging social, emotional and intellectual learning," she added.

### **Robotics Having Remarkable Impact On Student Progress**

To really motivate a student, "identify an activity they would walk over water to participate in," BBLC Principal Sandy Giardino advised, during a recent Better Together podcast.

"Hands down, integrating NAO Robots in our special needs classrooms at BBLC and BBLC/Secondary is engaging students in a way we have never seen," she said.

Students at NuView Academy and NuView Academy Annex are also learning valuable computer coding skills, an in demand workplace competency, demonstrating improved behavior, and recognizing the value of peer collaboration. The other educators on *Better Together*, the ESCNJ podcast hosted by Coordinator of Communications David Sandler, were equally impressed.

"Students with nonfunctional verbal abilities, and limited social and self-care skills are experiencing remarkable success," said BBLC Teacher Naomi Glassman.

The NAO Robot, is 23 inches tall;

weighs 9.5 pounds; has two eyes (high definition cameras), and a mouth (four directional microphones and loudspeakers). Those features and others enable students to program the robots to talk, hear, walk, and other functions.

"Our students bring challenging behavioral and learning issues to the table, so the learning engagement the robotics curriculum is having is, quite

frankly, astounding," said Dr. Scott Taylor, a member of the ESCNJ Board of Director's Executive Committee, and Superintendent of the Highland Park School District.

"It's a model other districts should consider exploring," Dr. Taylor added.

Mr. Gary Molenaar, ESCNJ's Assistant Superintendent was instrumental in bringing the three robots into the curriculum, and said: "It is possible some students will have employable computer coding skills when they graduate."

Staff collaboration is another key, said NuView Academy Teacher Laura Cagle.

The support from administrators and other teachers helped build my skills and comfort level," she said.

During a presentation at the Techspo 17 convention, Ms. Glassman said many participants were "humbled" by the experience.

"Many people assume computer coding functions are beyond the capabilities of our students, so when some educators had difficulty doing what many of our students can do, it offered great insight into appreciating the diversity of the human mind," Ms. Glassman said. •

#### **Nature Trail For ALC Students**

Greg Braun, Monroe High School Junior and Boy Scout Troop #3 members, coordinated volunteers, and secured donations to construct a wheelchair accessible "Nature Trail" for ALC students. The project served to demonstrate his leadership skills in his effort to become an Eagle Scout.
